From Da Prez

I'm going to try again, hopefully this one will make it up to our editor. Seems that not all email arrives as intended. I really did have a January letter ready in time for the SIGNAL, and e-mailed it up to Dan so that he would not have to retype it from a snail mail hard copy. Unfortunately it did not get to him.

In this issue, hopefully, you will find the High Sierra 2007 events schedule. After considering the results of the December 'WHAT WOULD YOU LIKE TO DO IN 2007' events survey, the board came up with, and presented, a proposed schedule at the January general meeting. After some discussion, the proposed schedule, as found elsewhere in this issue, was voted on and accepted. I hope that we have found something for everyone. I am asking Dan to also include the actual results of the survey elsewhere in this issue.

In visiting with Al Messler, of the Sagebrush Flyers Gardnerville club, I learned that club has scheduled their Pattern Flying contest for the 18th and 19th of August. It is hoped that the Carson and Reno clubs will be well represented, both as participants and as spectators. The prizes are truly awesome, big bucks, and the level of flying should be great. We have some really outstanding pilots ourselves, and we would like to see you folks out there showing them how it is supposed to be done.

Along those lines, our own Flying Scale contest will be dubbed the Tri-Club Scale Contest, as it intended that members of the Gardnerville and Reno clubs will show up to give us some real competition, and new ships that we have not seen before. This contest is now scheduled for August 4th and 5th.

Following the Tri-club theme, the Reno club will be sponsoring a War Bird Contest, again a Tri-club event. I have not yet learned of a date for this event.

To make these truly Tri-club affairs, I suppose that there should be volunteers from each club for each event. I hope that a few of us will do so. It would probably be fun to see some of the events even if not competing. I know that Pattern and War bird racing sure impress me.

Actually, we have planned two High Sierra scale events for this summer. The first will be the cornerstone of Les Harris's Memorial Fly Day. This will be a static only contest (although the ships can certainly be flown also), judged on scale and appearance, with a controlled taxi required. The second, an actual flying scale event, as held last year, will be judged on a proof of scale drawing (or photo), and on a pilot on board. There will be two classes, as per last year. Classes will include ships flown by the owner/builder, and ships flown by someone other than the owner. This will also be our annual OPEN HOUSE day, the general public invited, free food, open flying, entertainment, and hopefully a couple of JET and/or HELI demonstration flights.

If any of you would like to do a soaring day, we could work it in on one of the Pony Express non-event days, we can certainly set something up during one of our summer meeting. Sounds like an engineless day might be fun, especially to one who does full size soaring on the odd week days. It's pretty easy to ride a thermal when you can feel it in the seat of your pants, but I don't see how one does it from hundreds of yards below.

Fullers Fruit Fly might want a little explanation. What Gary intends is that each person that makes a flight on the day of his event will receive a raffle ticket after completing the flight. At the end of the day, real live fruit will be raffled off to the participants. You will not have to win the event, just make a flight, and have a knife and fork ready for eating your prize.

We are going to try to participate in the Carson Airport Open House again this year. If so, it is planned that Tom R will set up his tent, Don M will transport the tables needed, and Gary F will be one of the hosts. If you still have a clean looking ship that far into the season, bring it out to the field and let us show it off. We might even pick up a new member or two that can keep us on our toes next year.

Now is a great time to do a really deep cycle battery servicing, especially those that you use the least. Most manufacturers recommend a full deep cycle at least four times annually. If you have been doing just one or two flights on a ship, those nicads will assume that you will never need their full rated capacity, and train themselves to deliver only what you normally use, not the number of flights that what you may want to do on a really great day. If you do not have a manufactured deep cycler, simply use your ammeter to determine a resistor (or pilot lamp bulb) that will draw appx. 350/400 mils from each of your batteries, then leave it connected to them until they are down to 0 volts. Then do a full charge, the same as was in your equipments manual for the first time charge. Of course, this may not be readily feasible with your TX, so you might just turn it on and leave it run until it shuts down, then do the full charge. If you can disconnect it's battery and do a full deep cycle, so much the better.

Don Morse made the trip to the annual AMA convention. Perhaps we can get a report at the Feb meeting. Made it myself last year, and there certainly is a lot of material for sale (and swap) displayed.

If you are going to be buying any new equipment this year, spend a few minutes browsing all that is available on Ebay. I just bought four brand new, still in factory boxes, Fatuba Digital BB servos (S-3151's) for \$62.00 (list at Tower is \$34.99 ea). You can also make great buys on complete systems, batteries, kits, etc.

Lastly, the first meeting to be held at the Round Table Pizza went quite well. Food for all, and the warm room complete with tables was nice. Also, it was surprisingly quiet with the doors closed, I was actually expecting a lot of customer noise from the main room.

PLEASE NOTE It was decided at the meeting to change our meeting time from 7:00 PM to 6:30, so that some of the buying of drinks and eating can be done ahead of the actual business meeting.
