Not only the cost of driving is lost, but those same 1&½ to 2 hours of driving time that some of us do could be made much better use of. I would prefer that it appear on our own club web site, rather than a separate one, and I will contact the San Jose club to see how they were able to do so with their weather station (it will probably turn out that they had electrical power at their field).

I had to be in Monterey Bay the weekend of the 17th, so could not work the First Alert and Silver Springs events, but understand that Dan E did a great job of moving the kiosk around, setting up and organizing both events. Many thanks Dan! And to the folks that displayed models, manned the booth, did the Silver Springs flights (even with the hassle from their officials) a hearty thank you also, as well as Harold and Tom for the use of their kiosk.

Have not yet heard the financial results of the combined Auction on the 10th, but I thought that it was well attended, and many items were sold. I believe that there were only two items that didn't sell. Robert seemed to have gotten a great deal on an Astro Hog (used to fly those in the late 50's), that I would like to have bought, but could not justify the price.
