


Next Meeting – Thursday, May 14th, Carson City Airport Terminal – 6:30 pm

The High Sierra Scale Contest will be held July 11 and 12. The contest will be a fun scale contest as was done several years ago with a couple of changes. In the past we have held basically two events, fun scale and team fun scale. They were flown and judged simultaneously but prizes were given for each event separately. This year we will run three events that will be flown simultaneously; Fun scale, team fun scale and aerobatic fun scale.

Fun scale and team fun scale will be limited to non aerobatic monoplanes and non aerobatic biplanes. (P-51 war bird types and PT-17 bi-plane types, Cessna types etc. Aerobatic fun scale will be for the Edges, Lasers, Yaks, Pitts, Ultimate's, and etc. type of planes. Maneuvers will be the ten specified by AMA. Required maneuvers are take-off, fly-by, horizontal figure eight, landing and realism in flight. The other five maneuvers are up to the pilot but must be appropriate for the type of plane entered. No snap rolls for B-17s etc. For maneuver examples for aerobatic and non-aerobatic planes read the scale article on page 107 of the March Model Aviation magazine.
