

## **Interesting Aircraft**

The media has just introduced (Dec 2022) the newest Air Force bomber called the B-21 Raider. This stealth flying wing jet propelled bomber has the latest technical advances incorporated.

Years before, the Northrop Aircraft Corporation introduced their new YC-125 that was a three-engine radial STOL military aircraft. The United States Air Force became the sole operator of the short lived aircraft as just twenty-three were built and operated from 1950 through 1955. The Northrop Aircraft Corporation was established in 1939, just before the official start of WW II. This one-off, high winged design held all the good traits of a useful military aircraft and was therefore adopted by the Air Force as the "Raider."



Overall length was 67 feet with a wingspan measuring 86.5 feet. Takeoff weight was rated at 42,000 pounds. Ground running was possible by a tail-dragger arrangement. Power was three Wright R-1820-99 "Cyclone" 9-cyliner radials generating 1,200 hp each. It had a maximum speed of 207 mph and cruised at 170 mph with a service ceiling of 12,000 feet. The Raider made it first flight on August 1, 1949. The Air Force commissioned thirteen built as troop transports and ten as Arctic rescue platforms with ski undercarriages. They were soon replaced by larger helicopters and cargo aircraft and sold in South America through private companies for their STOL capabilities.




### Reno Squadron
