Electric Fun Fly

Twenty-nine electric aircraft enjoyed one of the most beautiful days of flying on Saturday, September 16th. I saw three in the sky at once with Consendos making a good showing. There were two jets, Pitts biplane, Radians, Adam's Italian sucker, P-51's, a Timber regular size and a mini one, the Enterprise, Klingon Bird of Prey, a Pulse, an Unlimited II (new to me), a night flyer with lights out, a Sukhoi, a Valiant, a couple T-28s, a P-80 jet, 1 Old Timer (not pilot, almost) P-47, FW 190 and finally a Flying wing. All these aircraft were flown by the eleven pilots enjoying themselves. A couple of dust clouds during landings but no "real" crashes.

We had a wide range of raffle prizes. The first selection was a trike gear set of retracts, followed by a OS 15 powered Dumas Air Boat, a small P-51 stick built, the little foam Apprentice, a short kit Thermal glider, a beautiful balsa Laser cut short kit for a 72 inch Spook old timer, and a 4-chanel 2.7 Futaba radio with a receiver.

Interesting Aircraft

The Bleriot 125 was an unusual passenger aircraft when displayed in Paris in 1938. Basically built of a wooden fuselage, it was a high wing design with a twin fuselages. Each fuselage carried six passengers and a toilet and baggage compartment. Interesting point, it had five vertical stabs.

With a wingspan of 96.5 feet and a gross weight of 16,000 pounds, it was not a light weight for its time. It had a maximum speed of 137 mph and a range of 621 miles. No ceiling was indicat-



ed. With a crew of three they carried 12 passengers. One of the pictures I ran across was an RC scale model of this type of aircraft, I wonder how it flew.

FIELD MARSHALL REPORT

Last month I reported that we would need to make a few minor runway repairs, the shade structure needs re-painting and the car track needs work. Since then a few cracks collapsed on the far side of the runway. We quickly filled in the cracks with asphalt and applied sealer over the patch which worked very well. We will need to fill and seal some additional cracks later this month.





The shade structure has been re-painted with premium paint as well as all the tables under the structure. The tables were not part of the original price quote but they did them anyway and left us the extra paint that we can use to paint the 2 wooden tables at the flight line and the big wooden sign in front of the clubhouse (volunteers please). I think the painters did an excel-

lent job and I would recommend them for any future painting needs.

Regarding the car track, we purchased a roll of drainage tubing the same as what's used to outline the track so we can replace any damaged tubing. Tim has already started the project and I'd like to ask him if any volunteers are needed.

Last I would like to mention that the road to the train station has been resurfaced which will make our drive to the field a much smoother one. A few club members had asked when our part of the road would be done. The answer is our road is a separate road from the V&T road and not part of their resurfacing project. And to be clear, our road is a side road off the V&T road. Traffic to and from the train station has the right-of-way.
